ULSTER SOLDIER WOUNDED IN KOREA FIGHTING

News that their son, Corporal Sydney C. Johnston, was wounded in Korea about eight days' ago, has been received by Mr and Mrs. A. Johnston, who reside at 115 Benburb Street, Belfast. They are now wait-

ing anxiously for further word on the extent of his wounds and how he is progressing.

Johnston Cpl. joined the Royal Marines four years ago and went to Korea in Septemwith ber the 41st Independent Marine Commando Unit. who have been engaged in some hard fighting the northin eastern sector of the front.

His wife, with their 20-months-



old daughter, re- **S. Johnston**, sides in Exeter, and it was to her that the official intimation was sent that her husband had been wounded.

FAMILY'S SERVICE RECORDS

The youngest of five sons. Cpl. Johnston's brother Andrew died of wounds in the last war. His father, an ex-Sergeant in the Royal Ulster Rifles, served in both World Wars.

Mrs. Johnston, too, belongs to a family with strong military traditions, for she had 47 relatives serving during the 1939-45 War.
