THE LATE SERGT. T. R. BISHOP

Funeral with Military Honours at Dosthill

A wide circle of friends at Dosthill and Tamworth heard with deep regret of the death in the service of his country of Sergeant Timothy Roland Bishop, Royal Marines. His frank and engaging personality made him well-liked and popular with all who knew him and he will be greatly missed. Aged 20, he was the son of Mr. T. S. Bishop, of Comberford Road, Tamworth. He was a native of Dosthill, and had lived there with his grandfather, Mr. J. W. Boonham, The Gables. Educated at the Tamworth Grammar School, before joining the Forces he was employed by the National Provincial Bank, at their Lichfield branch. His 3½ years service with the Royal Marines had included participation in the North Africa campaign and the invasion of Sicily.

Military honours were accorded at the funeral at Dosthill on Monday, and manifestations of esteem and sympathy were such that St. Paul's Church was more than filled and many unable to gain admittance gathered in the churchyard. The cortege was headed by the British Legion standards, that of the Kingsbury branch carried by Mr. W. Jordan, and that of the Tamworth branch by Mr. G. Goodwin, with naval and military escort. A guard of honour was formed by Royal Navy, Army, Royal Air Force and Home Guard personnel, under Lieut. J. S. Elliott (Pioneer Corps), and including Home Guard officers, Major E. Jackson, Capt. B. Aucott and Lieut. Price. As the coffin, draped with the Union Jack and carried shoulder high by khaki-clad bearers was taken into the church, the standards were dipped and the guard of honour came to the salute. The officiating clergy were the Rev. N. P. Frost (Vicar of Kingsbury), the Rev. F. W. Walton (Vicar of Warton), and the Rev. E. S. Thomas (Priest-in-charge, Dosthill). Sergt. H. Andrews (Home Guard) was at the organ, and during the service the hymns "The King of Love my Shepherd is," and "O Valiant Hearts" were sung, and Psalm 23 "The Lord is my Shepherd" and the "Nunc Dimittis" were chanted.

In the course of a short address, the Rev. F. W. Walton, after speaking in intimate terms of his acquaintance, as a former neighbour as well as a priest, with their gallant young friend, quoted words from the Epistle to the Hebrews "Those who die in faith, not having received the promises, but having seen them afar off." Rupert Brooke had written: "If I should die think only this of me: There is some corner of a foreign field that is for ever England." For them that day their own village became "as it were united with, and part of, the soil of France, for the liberation of which our men are giving their lives." Even before the war started Roland Bishop had, in the spirit of high adventure looked forward to the time when he could play his part. He had gone joyfully into the battle. Of him it could be said that tranquil he lay, "his knightly virtue proved." May his memory be hallowed in the land he loved. They were bound to mourn but not without hope, for at the centre of the Christian faith stood the full assurance of resurrection to eternal life for those who died in faith.

The interment was in the churchyard, and at the graveside the hymn "Peace, Perfect Peace" was sung. Mr. A. Pegg, who was in Civil Defence uniform sounded the "Last Post" and Reveille."
